

Body-mind care





Job interview tips

- Research the institution
- Research the people interviewing you (if possible)
- Research the programme/scheme you are hired for
- Tailor your preparation to the position advertised
- Repeat/echo the language of the ad in the interview if it fits
- Speak (and ask questions) as if the interviewers are your colleagues
- Don't worry if you fluff a question ask for a question to be repeated if you need it.
- REMEMBER: the results of these interviews are not a reflection on you.
